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Strategic overview

Strategic insights I

- 1,107 residents completed a MARKYT® Community Scorecard and 901 residents completed a
 MARKYT® Wellbeing Scorecard to rate local services and facilities, and share their thoughts
 and ideas about how to improve quality of life in the Coffs Harbour region.
- The Coffs Harbour region is considered to be a **great place to live** with 91% of respondents giving overall positive ratings, and quality of life receiving a mean rating of 7.4 out of 10, compared to 7.1 for Australia overall. Community members are generally optimistic that their quality of life will improve over the next five years.
 - Looking across all measures, ratings tend to be more positive in Korora Beach to Sapphire Beach.
 Ratings tend to be lower among people with disability, First Nations people, and in Boambee / Bonville, from Moonee Beach to Sandy Beach, and in Orara Valley and surrounds.
- 76% of respondents noticed positive changes in the region over the past two years. The most recognised changes were revitalisation of the Coffs Jetty precinct, Coffs Harbour bypass, and appointment of a new leadership team.
- The region is **well regarded as a place to visit** with a performance index score of 74 out of 100. This is seven points above the average score achieved by councils participating in the MARKYT® benchmarking program across Australia (n=49 councils).



Strategic insights II

- The **highest performing areas** in Coffs are sport and recreation, lifeguard services, library services, and how respect is shown for Gumbaynggirr people and their culture. Self-reported general health also improved with 87% of respondents providing a good to excellent rating, up from 78% in 2020.
- Since 2018, performance ratings fell across many service areas and, often, are below the industry average.
- Although performance ratings dropped the most for water supply, stormwater management and sewerage, this is still one of the highest performing areas, and other services are considered higher priority to improve.
- The highest priority areas to improve are roads, footpaths and cycleways, health and community services, waste services, economic development, and responsible growth and development.
- While marine facilities received lower ratings compared to other councils, marine facilities are a lower priority to address.



Strategic insights III

- The community would like a clear and well communicated vision for the future, stronger leadership, more effective lobbying and advocacy, improved governance, greater value for money from Council rates, and to be better informed and consulted about local issues.
- Only 15% of respondents think Coffs Council has a good understanding of community needs.
 They are concerned that local community views are not being heard or taken into account by Council when making decisions, and that reasons for decisions are not well communicated.
- More consultation is wanted. Online surveys are preferred by 80% of respondents, followed by the Have Your Say online platform (39%), postal surveys (31%) and social media (29%).
- More communication is needed. Residents would prefer to receive information and updates from Coffs Harbour City Council via email messages (41%), followed by e-newsletters (32%) and social media posts (32%).
- It will be important to use targeted communication approaches to meet different customer needs. While email messages are the preferred channel of communication overall, families with primary school aged children prefer enewsletters, younger adults, households with teenagers and renters prefer social media, and seniors and people who mainly speak a language other than English prefer the local newspaper.









Local roads

Community Driven Actions

- Repair road surfaces, especially potholes, in a way that will last long-term. Consider resurfacing roads where necessary.
- Maintain road surfaces to a high standard to keep them safe and good repair.
- Install drains and kerbs to prevent water damage and flooding.
- Plan traffic networks that can accommodate increasing traffic in the area.

Community Voices

"The state of the roads in Coffs Harbour are terrible. Constant patching up holes is terrible. Do the job correctly, strip the road back, compact the road again, then resurface."

"By fixing potholes in a timely manner and in a way that will last, not just quick fixes.

Roads around Toormina area need upgrades that are sustainable,

constantly dodging potholes."

"I know the potholes are due to recent ongoing rain, but even when holes are filled, the next time it rains they're back. Some streets need digging up and resealing."

"Road maintenance continues to be done cheaply and repeatedly rather than quality that lasts."

"Better maintenance and upgrading programs - The recent rains have highlighted the inadequacy of the standards of construction and maintenance."

"There are streets in urban areas with no kerb and guttering. As the rainfall is high, restoration of roads takes too long. Some streets built as long ago as the 1950s require a lot of drainage work despite ratepayers paying for all those years."

"Fix up roads in all existing suburbs. I have lived in a street for 35 years without kerb and gutters and adequate stormwater drainage."

"Long-term planning with short-term goals to identify areas of high need to improve traffic flow."

"Create a full traffic network to improve flow of traffic in and around Coffs Harbour and CBD. Traffic Planning for too long has relied on the spine of the Pacific Highway to drive any where in Coffs Harbour. This only results in increased traffic congestion on the Highway as everyone has to drive on the Highway to get to anywhere in Coffs Harbour."



Community Driven Actions

- Provide a more extensive network of wellconnected footpaths for the safety of pedestrians, parents with prams, people with mobility aids, and wheelchair users.
- Provide a safe system of well-connected cycleways to encourage cycling for commuting and leisure.
- Keep all footpaths and cycleways clean and well maintained, so they are safe for all users.
- Create more bushwalks and trails to encourage walking for recreation and tourism.

Community Voices

"Build footpaths on streets that don't have them. So many streets don't have footpaths."

"All streets in the Coffs Harbour electorate need to have at least a footpath on one side of the road. The current situation is in and of itself hazardous to the elderly, disabled, young kids and mothers with prams who have to use roads, or unkempt nature strips that invariably have cars parked on them."

"Footpaths, cycleways etc. basically don't exist in Coffs Harbour. With the growing community population, particularly with young families, this needs to be addressed immediately."

"Construction of new cycleways and better connections between existing cycleways to improve separation of road traffic and cyclists to make cycling more pleasurable and safer."

"As a pedestrian, I am horrified at the lack of maintenance throughout Coffs Harbour and the lack of safety and or consideration afforded to pedestrians at all."

"More funds spent on the maintenance of footpaths/cycleways in local areas, where there are large potholes that have not been attended to for many months."

"Put in trails along coastline like there are in almost every town in Qld and some coastal NSW towns. Add to what is there. Update or include signage so that people know they are there and where they are - no use thinking no more people are coming here...update this town!!!"

"Having lived in 4 of Australia's major cities, the best liveable cities are the ones that are progressive with footpaths, trails and cycleways. They take traffic off the roads promoting decongestion, they promote an active lifestyle, and they attract tourists from all over the world who want to come to Coffs to enjoy the outdoors."



Health and community services / facilities

Community Driven Actions

- Work with the state government to develop a strategy to attract and retain a wide range of health professionals in Coffs Harbour, including:
 - o GPs
 - Specialists
 - Mental health services
 - Allied health professionals
- Lobby the state government to further expand the hospital so that it is fully equipped and staffed to service the local population.
- Provide better access to GPs and after-hours medical centres to relieve pressure on the hospital.

Community Voices

"More effort at attracting health professionals to the area."

"Timely access to a doctor and specialist instead of waiting for weeks for an appointment."

"More access to services, particularly support for mental health and allied health services."

"Consultative planning, infrastructure and health services, staff/jobs to match population growth, advocacy for increased medical specialists, nurses, GP's at acceptable ratios, retention and encouragement of same to reside in Coffs."

"The hospital should have been built much bigger to cater for our growing population."

"More funds from government to open beds in hospital and attract and pay key medical personnel."

"To start with a hospital that is adequate for the population, more doctors, more nurses, more mental health the list goes on and on."

"More a state/federal issue but we need more access to GPs. The hospital is overwhelmed with non-urgent patients as there is no way to get a go appointment at an affordable price or an acceptable time frame."

"Require more medical centres open over the weekend to relieve hospital wait times."

"On the weekend, the ED is swamped with low-acuity presentations, and I've had to bring children there multiple times when I could have taken them to a GP were one open (e.g. for minor lacerations)."



Priority 4: Community Action Plan Waste and recycling services

Community Driven Actions

- Provide a new waste management facility.
 Problems with the current tip include the smell and needing to transport excess waste to Queensland.
- Encourage recycling. Educate the public and provide more recycling stations and bins.
- Reinstate kerbside collections for bulk waste.

Community Voices

"We need another Waste Facility in Coffs Harbour. Our Tip is full and overflowing."

"Sort the tip out. It's a disgrace. The smell is abominable and it's a gross waste of ratepayer funds to be transporting our waste out of the area for processing."

"We currently truck our waste away, our tip is at the end of its life, hard rubbish collection has been taken away. Our waste issues continuously get temporary measures implemented. I want to see adequate, long term solutions."

"Dispose of our waste in the area instead of spending huge amounts of money to truck it elsewhere. Build a larger tip. Become a national leader in recycling and support local businesses to explore commercial applications of recycled products."

"Better recycling facilities, soft plastics recycled, free green waste disposal, not shortterm vision and sending our waste to other council areas (at great expense)."

"Better access to recycling. The road to the recycling is poorly maintained and too far away for many residents. Toxic materials including battery and paint disposal at Council chambers or at any place that wants to sell these products."

"With the rate notices send out stickers that go on each bin telling people what goes in each bin. Take school children and locals out to the recycling place, again, so people can see what goes on, do it on different days, at different times, including the weekend, to educate the locals."

"A twice annual kerbside recycling service would prevent a lot of goods ending up in landfill as many people recycle those goods before collection day."

"Removal of the big item street collections has created environmental problems in the bush (just ask the rural fire services what they are finding in the bush... often set alight to hide identity). We need better facilities to deal with waste rather than shipping it elsewhere."



Priority 5: Community Action Plan

Economic development

Community Driven Actions

- Develop a strategy to attract a wider range of industry and commercial enterprises to the area to:
 - Provide jobs for local residents
 - Encourage young people to stay in Coffs Harbour
- Provide incentives to support local businesses and to and attract and retain new businesses, eg affordable rent, rates concessions.
- Provide apprenticeships and support for education and training.
- Develop the coast and jetty area as a premium tourist attraction.

Community Voices

"Attracting business/industry to our area, so the people do not have to leave to find employment."

"For more than a generation, school leavers who want to pursue professional careers leave the city. The region has an amazing natural/ geographic foundation that can support an idyllic and aspirational way of life. But there is no economic vision for how to evolve the LGA beyond its base agri/service centre/ tourism foundation."

"Interesting employment for youth and young adults to keep them in the area."

"Encourage businesses to centralise here by offering affordable land, facilities and if necessary, rate concessions in existing zoned areas."

"Consider ways to encourage start up small business for example I work my business from home so maybe offer rate discount or financial incentive to employee someone under a certain age to assist with youth unemployment."

"Coffs Harbour Council once used to offer traineeships and apprenticeships to locals.

Now they rely heavily on labour hire. I believe the Council should revert back to apprenticeships and traineeships."

"Supporting more short courses that lead to employment and working with businesses to fill gaps by training people who already live here."

"Jetty revitalisation for a start. Plenty of employment opportunities there to start, and longer-term flow on effects of increased tourism."

"We are purportedly a tourist town but we have no "jewel in the crown" at the jetty to support this. We need to develop our beaches as a tourist haven as have other councils in north Queensland."



Responsible growth and development

Community Driven Actions

- Allow more housing development to support a growing population. There are mixed views about how to do this including:
 - Release more land for development
 - Allow subdivision of rural lots
 - Allow higher density developments to limit sprawl
- Ensure housing developments provide affordable housing options.
- Ensure development is sympathetic to the area –
 limit high rise, retain green spaces and country feel.
- Ensure development is supported by adequate infrastructure and amenities including public transport, sewers, schools, and parking.
- There are mixed views about development of the jetty area, including:
 - The area should be developed to attract tourists and provide more amenities in the area
 - Concern about overdevelopment, loss of natural beauty and loss of access for general public

Community Voices

"Housing supply is insufficient to meet the demands of the current population, so how can we sustain further growth? Clearly, housing development is needed, but it needs to cater for all socioeconomic profiles."

"Open up the green space for development. We are in a housing crisis. We do not live in an inner city where we should just be building up."

"Allow acreage, particularly west of highway, to be broken into smaller lots and sold/built on."

"Start rethinking the whole building and growth policy. We are a cancer spreading on this planet. Lets start thinking up instead of out."

"Affordable housing, focusing on the needs of residents and workers, rather than the visitors and tourists."

"Genuinely consider long term impact of ALL development, particularly in coastal strips of CH LGA, to ensure the laid-back coastal lifestyle that exists is maintained long term - that is what attracts people to live in and visit the area - NOT high rise developments obstructing ocean fronts and restricting easy public access to the ocean and rivers/creeks."

"We need to make sure we don't grow too fast that we cannot provide jobs, schools, parking and quality of life. With growth and development must come adequate infrastructure and facilities."

"Developing the jetty area into a major tourism attraction, linked to the CBD."

"I don't like the idea of developing the jetty area. It is a public space with natural beauty. Don't put high rises and develop it for the elite please."

"Keep the jetty precinct for everyone to use and enjoy not just for private development and profit!"

Approach

The Study

Coffs Harbour City Council commissioned CATALYSE® to conduct MARKYT® Community Scorecard and MARKYT® Wellbeing Scorecard studies.

The purpose of these studies was to:

- Evaluate and benchmark Council performance
- Assess community health and wellbeing indicators
- Determine local needs and priorities

Scorecard invitations were posted to a random sample of 4,000 households in the Coffs Harbour region using Australia Post addressed mail services. 2,000 households received a Community Scorecard and 2,000 households received a Wellbeing Scorecard. Respondents could complete the scorecard in hard copy or online.

Coffs Harbour City Council provided supporting promotions.

This included social media posts, reaching out to local community groups and schools, and emailing scorecard invitations to customers.

Scorecards were submitted between 13 June and 1 July 2022.

- Wellbeing Scorecards were completed by 901 residents.
- Community Scorecards were completed by 1,107 residents.



Among the Community Scorecard sample, 188 respondents owned or operated a local business. The views of business owners and operators have been analysed and reported separately at the end of this report.

In addition to these responses, another 36 residents took part who were closely affiliated with Coffs Harbour City Council. They identified as a Councillor, employee or someone who shared a household with a Councillor or employee. The views of Council affiliated respondents have been analysed and reported separately at the end of this report.






Overall, how good is your life when you step back and think about it? Please give a score out of 10 where 0 is the worst possible life for you and 10 is the best possible life for you.

- How would you score your life now?
- How do you think you would score your life in about <u>five years from now?</u>

This question is based on the Cantril Self-Anchoring Striving Scale (Cantril, 1965) and is used by leading organisations such as Gallup and OECD to calculate benchmark scores for 'quality of life'.

Gallup classify respondents into three segments:

1. Thriving - wellbeing that is strong, consistent, and progressing. These respondents have positive views of their present life situation (7+) and have positive views of the next five years (8+).

According to Gallup studies, this segment reports significantly fewer health problems, fewer sick days, less worry, stress, sadness, anger, and more happiness, enjoyment, interest, and respect.

2. Struggling - wellbeing that is moderate or inconsistent. These respondents have moderate views of their present life situation OR moderate OR negative views of their future. They are either struggling in the present, or expect to struggle in the future.


According to Gallup studies, this segment reports more daily stress and worry about money than the "thriving" respondents, and more than double the amount of sick days. They are more likely to smoke, and are less likely to eat healthy.

3. Suffering - wellbeing that is at high risk. These respondents have poor ratings of their current life situation (4 and below) AND negative views of the next five years (4 and below).

According to Gallup studies, people in this segment are more likely to report lacking the basics of food and shelter, more likely to have physical pain, a lot of stress, worry, sadness, and anger. They have less access to health insurance and care, and more than double the disease burden, in comparison to "thriving" respondents.

84% of respondents recalled Gumbaynggirr is the name of the local Aboriginal nation, up from 53% in 2020 and 48% in 2018.



- Younger adults tend to be more involved in sport, art and culture, and environmental activities, while seniors are more involved in organised social activities (such as community events, meet ups, church, book clubs, etc).



MARKYT priorities among local residents who own or operate a local business


